

Scotland's Census 2022 – Outputs aims

- Maximise the value from the census
 - Ensuring that outputs meets users' needs
 - Publishing down to levels of geographies other statistics cannot
 - Make as much data available to users as possible
- Make data available to users through a Flexible Table Builder
- Ensure that what we publish is safe and does not lead to the identification of individuals and households through census outputs

Around 176,000 veterans living in Scotland, finds 'milestone' data collection

In Scotland, half of all veterans (50.4%) were aged 65 and over and just under one third (30.6%) were aged 50 to 64.






Scotland's Census data has secured hundreds of items of media coverage. These are the top reports ordered by the number of opportunities to see then. Not all items of coverage are equal so this tells us which were most high profile.

Census-based statistics UK: 2021

- The Office for National Statistics recently published **UK 2021 census estimates for a range of topics**.
- This has been a collaboration between the ONS, NRS and the Northern Ireland Statistics and Research Agency (NISRA).
- The publication includes topic-based tables and a quality and methodology guide.

Scotland's Census 2031

- NRS has recommended a mandatory questionnaire-based census planned for 2031.
- The recommendation, made to Scottish Ministers, is for the census to be held at the same time as censuses in the rest of the UK.
- As with previous censuses, NRS will work closely with ONS and NISRA on the design and build of the census.
- Scottish Ministers have accepted in principle NRS's recommendation, with further detailed plans to follow.

NISRA Update: Census

NISRA recently published its recommendation for the future of census and population statistics in Northern Ireland

The NI recommendation paper discusses how both surveys and administrative data face challenges.

- Surveys: expensive and time-consuming increasingly impacted by declining response rates.
- Administrative data: issues with coverage, consistency and definitions may be hard to access in the face of legal and technical barriers.

Reflecting on this, NISRA concluded that:

- A **census in 2031** is required to capture the full range of information needed, particularly the need for information on specific population sub-groups for equality monitoring.
- Administrative data can play a key supporting role in census operations, quality assurance of data and production of estimates as evidenced by NISRA's experience to date of integrating administrative data into recent censuses.

This recommendation does not constitute a decision to take a 2031 census in Northern Ireland - it is now for the Northern Ireland Executive to consider.



NISRA Update: Population Statistics

- NISRA mainly uses the cohort component method to produce population estimates at the national level
 - Using birth/death registrations, and GP registration data to estimate migration
- For lower-level geography estimation, NISRA combines this with the Ratio Change method
 - This incorporates a range of administrative data sources to estimate levels of population change
 - Sources include: GP registration data, electoral roll, benefit claimants, schools' information Management System, and Higher Education enrolments
 - Combining the two methods ensures that the resulting estimates are calibrated to high-coverage admin sources
- That approach has been successful in the past with, for example, the 2021 estimate of the population (rolled forward from the 2011 census) being within 0.26% of the census estimate at the national level
- Despite this level of accuracy, new datasets and new methods are being explored to refine the estimation process even further
- NISRA is actively working with ONS and NRS to develop methodologies and ensure coherence with population statistics
 across the UK
